A-Train Rolling into Denton County

DCTA BOARD APPROVES EXPANDED A-TRAIN SERVICE LEVELS 11/18/10

On November 18, 2010, the Denton County Transportation Authority Board of Directors approved the service levels for the A-train to include expanded service on Friday nights and Saturday.

In anticipation of the A-train launch in June 2011 and in response to a reduction in sales tax revenues and increased capital costs, DCTA has spent the last four months studying what levels of service the Authority could afford to operate and gathering public input on the proposed service levels. Initially, the Authority proposed a schedule that only included peak period service Monday through Friday.

In response to public feedback and strong sales tax performance over the last few months, DCTA began considering the addition of off-peak service on Friday night and Saturday. The expanded service levels include operation of the A-train until 11 p.m. on Friday

and 12 a.m. on Saturday. Monday through Thursday service will end at 8:30 p.m. The expanded service will be operated as pilot program with set performance measurements. Continuation of such service beyond the first year of operation will be dependent upon the service meeting ridership standards and sales tax meeting budgeted goals.

"Today's vote is a result of careful deliberation by our Board to ensure that we are operating transit services that meets the needs of our community but in a fiscally viable manner," stated Jim Witt, DCTA Chief Executive Officer.

The A-train, which is anticipated to open in June 2011, will connect with DART's Green Line and provide service to five stations within Denton County. This project has been a priority of DCTA since the Authority's adoption of its Service Plan in 2003.

TICKETING AND FARES

To establish a seamless and consistent fare structure, DART and DCTA's Board of Directors approved the reciprocal fare agreement in late 2010. DCTA and DART began honoring Regional Passes of the other entity on December 1, 2010.

REGIONAL PASSES

As of December 1, Regional Passes are valid on Connect, Connect RSVP, UNT Shuttle Commuter Express and the A-train as well as DART, TRE and The T. Demand response is not included. Passengers may transfer to another service within the Regional System at no additional charge by obtaining a transfer slip from the bus operator. Visit the DCTA website for more detailed Fare Information.

LOCAL SYSTEM PASSES

As of December 1, Local System Passes are valid on Connect, Connect RSVP, UNT Shuttle as well as trips within Denton County on Commuter Express and the A-train. Passengers may transfer to another service within the Local System at no additional charge by obtaining a transfer slip from the bus operator. Passengers wishing to transfer to the Regional System will need to pay the appropriate upgrade upon transfer. Visit the DCTA website for more detailed [Fare Information](#).

Passes are available for purchase at Lewisville City Hall, Highland Village City Hall, TWU Commuter Services (Student Union, 2nd floor), DCTA Operations or [online](#). Passes may also be purchased (using cash, check or money order) from DCTA bus operators the first and last three days of the month. Annual Regional Passes are only available for purchase online and require a photo ID. When the A-train begins service in June 2011, tickets will also be available for purchase from ticket vending machines located at each rail station.

NEW FLOOD MAPS SHOW CURRENT RISKS; GET FLOOD INSURANCE FOR PROTECTION

Denton County, TX Flood Maps Ready for Release

DENTON, Texas – Denton County, Texas homeowners, business and residential renters, and business owners who do not have flood insurance are encouraged to buy coverage now to get the best possible premiums before new flood insurance rate maps go into effect.

The new Denton County flood maps, which include all of the communities in Denton County, become effective on **Monday, April 18** giving homeowners, business owners and residential renters who haven't purchased flood insurance yet, time to get the best possible premiums to protect their property from potential flooding.

"While many people are required by mortgage and lending companies to have flood insurance, FEMA and the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) strongly recommend that everyone have flood insurance," said Region 6 Administrator Tony Russell. "The reason is simple: You don't have to be in a mapped floodplain to flood."

Current policy holders and those planning to purchase NFIP protection are strongly encouraged to contact their insurance agent or company to ensure that they have adequate coverage for building and contents that accounts for new flood risk data.

Those who purchase flood insurance prior to April 18 may be able to grandfather the current flood zone, saving money on flood insurance. For more information on estimated rates for flood insurance, whether you are eligible for grandfathering, and the Preferred Risk Policy extension, or to locate an agent in your area, visit www.floodsmart.gov.

If you have not seen the maps and would like to, please contact your local Floodplain Administrator (FPA). This person may be located in your City Hall or County Courthouse.

HICKORY CREEK & THE UPPER TRINITY RIVER WATER AUTHORITY TEAM FOR HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION EVENT

On Saturday May 21, 2011, the Town of Hickory Creek will team with the Upper Trinity River Water Authority to collect hazardous household waste at Arrowhead Park.

Beginning May 2nd, the first 40 residences to apply will be issued a free voucher to drop off their unwanted household chemicals for recycling or disposal. Chemicals accepted include paints, cleaners, used oil and other automotive fluids, adhesives, pesticides, etc. Tires, light bulbs and batteries will also be collected. Residents are urged to first attempt to recycle any usable substances by giving them to someone who is able to use them. Residents may also work with their neighbors by collecting several household's hazardous waste and dropping it at the event under a single voucher. Chemicals should be kept in their original containers, if possible, and be properly labeled. Containers will not be returned. All items for recycling must be listed on the back of the voucher by type.

Ammunition, explosives, medical waste, propane or butane cylinders, radioactive material and business waste will not be accepted.

Superior Recycling will also be on-site to collect computers, computer accessories, televisions, and household batteries. If the donator wants their hard drive crushed there is a \$10 fee; TV recycling is \$40.00. It is recommended that any personal information be removed from the computer's hard drive prior to recycling. Keep Hickory Creek Beautiful will collect old cell phones for donation to Denton County Friends of the Family for the battered women's program through Denton Outreach.

To be issued a voucher, those wishing to participate should come to Town Hall during normal business hours beginning Monday May 2nd with proof of Hickory Creek residency. E-mail and telephone requests will not be accepted and vouchers are issued on a first come, first served basis. After the complimentary vouchers are claimed, additional vouchers will be available at a cost of \$90 each.

Scofflaw Bill 86

The Scofflaw Program was established by the Legislature in 1995, allowing counties to refuse registration of a vehicle belonging to an owner with an outstanding arrest warrant from a municipality.

Senator Jane Nelson initiated Senate Bill 86, which asked that Section 702.002 of the Transportation Code be repealed. This section reads that the chapter pertaining to the "Scofflaw Program" applies to home-rule municipalities only, excluding general law cities.

With its small population, the Town of Hickory Creek is classified as a general law municipality. The bill will allow general law municipalities, which are cities with less than 5,000 residents, to participate in the program and more effectively adjudicate outstanding warrants.

Gayla Martin, the Hickory Creek municipal court clerk, testified on March 16 before the Senate Intergovernmental Relations Committee that small cities, such as Hickory Creek, that have major highways and commercial development experience increased traffic flow that is comparable to a much larger city. Because of this increased flow of traffic, citations are written in order to enhance public safety within our cities. Courts must have the tools to enforce the citation, or there is no public safety or accountability when violations occur.

Ms. Martin went on to say that general law cities handle citations just like every other Municipal Court in the State of Texas, and the same tools should be made available to all courts.

The bill was uncontested and submitted to the Senates' uncontested calendar on March 31st, 2011.

10 Things You Should Teach Your Children About a New Pet

If you're a parent, you've probably heard pleas from your kids to get a family pet. And while bringing a new animal into the family can be rewarding, fun and exciting, there can be a steep learning curve when the pet first arrives. Here is some advice for making kids, parents and pets feel safe, comfortable and happy.



What To Teach Your Children

1. Be gentle and calm. Before the pet arrives, practice greeting the pet gently and calmly with your children. So many kids shriek and scream with excitement as they run up to dogs or cats, but children should be taught not to run up to any animal, either their own pet or one in public. They should approach dogs or cats in a calm manner, talking to the pet in a nice voice. Children can be taught to call a puppy or kitten to come to them and, with supervision, can give a puppy a treat for coming when called.

2. Understand that the dog or cat isn't a toy. Although they may be soft and furry like a favorite stuffed animal, it's important that your child understand that the pet needs to be treated like a real member of the family. Using a stuffed animal, you can sit down with your children and practice how they should stroke and interact with the family pet while reminding them that the real pet will be much different than a toy. Children should always softly pet the puppy or kitten with no pulling or tugging allowed.

3. Make sure there's an adult is around when they play with the pet. This can be a tough one to enforce in a busy household, we know, but it is one of the first things you should teach. Things can go wrong pretty quickly between an inquisitive young child and an animal.

4. Respect the pet's basic needs and moods. Your children should learn that just as with a human baby, young animals need lots of rest. Tell them to not bother a puppy or kitten when it's sleeping or resting, and if the pet walks away from play, assure them that the pet just needs a break. Children need to learn how to tell when the pet wants to interact and is relaxed and happy, and when the animal is less happy or wants to go and do something else.

5. Do pet chores. A great way to give your children a sense of responsibility is to have the entire family help with the pet. Consider holding a family meeting where each family member has a specific task for the week. Each week, mix up the duties (always make sure the child can reasonably complete the task, even if it's just for a couple times a week), so that everyone is engaged and no one's chore gets "forgotten."

6. Treat animals the way they themselves would like to be treated. Sometimes children lash out with a kick or a shove against their parents or siblings, and there is the risk that kid might do the same thing to express anger against a pet. Explain that all animals want to feel safe and loved. Pets don't like being teased with words, toys or food, and you should teach your child to never hit, kick or strike your pet.

7. Realize the new pet will be annoying at times. Help your child understand that bringing an animal home is a bit life-changing, almost like adding a new child to the family. Set up the expectation that this new family member will require extra attention from Mommy and Daddy, as it's just a baby and needs extra care.

8. Understand the dog or cat might play favorites. Sometimes a new puppy or kitty may seem to prefer one person in the family over another, and this can lead to hurt feelings by the other family members. Ask your little ones to be patient as the pet may take awhile to come around.

9. Help keep the pet safe. Teach your child that they need to keep their eyes open to make sure the pet stays safe from everyday household dangers like foods they shouldn't be eating or gates in the yard that are not latched all the way. It is the entire family's responsibility to take care of the new pet and to give it a loving and happy home.

10. Empathize with the animal. It's not enough to pet the cat gently or keep from yelling at the dog (although those are good habits to master); children should be taught to try and look at things through the pet's eyes, especially when it first comes home. The more they think about things from the dog or cat's perspective, the better a pet sibling they will be.

And, of course, the best thing to teach your child is how awesome and rewarding having a pet in the family can be!


