

LAKE SIDE NEWS

Dear Fellow Citizens,

I hope your Fall is off to a great start! Our council had a busy summer as we prepared for the coming fiscal year, which started October 1.

I am pleased to announce that the Town Council adopted a balanced budget for 2018-2019 and adopted a property tax rate of .347535 per \$100 of assessed value. The total property tax values for Hickory Creek were \$471,201,451 in 2017 and increased to \$564,511,828 for the 2018 tax year.

The significant increase in our overall value can be attributed to the voluntary annexation of Steeplechase North, which added over \$41 million to our town's value, new homes that have been built in Hickory Creek in the past year (approximately \$21 million), and the increased value of existing homes.

It's important to note, however, that our Council adopted the Effective Tax Rate, which provides the town the same amount of revenue as the prior year on properties taxed in both years. The Council reduced the tax rate from 0.366933 (prior year's rate) to 0.347535 per \$100 of value. In other words, as values have increased, the Council has reduced the tax rate to offset increased tax bills for our citizens. Your property tax bill includes school, county and Hickory Creek taxes, but the only tax affected by this rate is your Hickory Creek tax.

Our council met recently in an extended work session to discuss goals and town projects for the coming year. Much of our discussion centered around our parks, because our parks play a vital role in the identity of our community. We have determined that we need to update our Parks Master Plan, and the Council is in the process of selecting a firm to guide us in our planning process. Other projects the council discussed include solar street lighting along Point Vista and Turbeville Roads, the addition of Hickory Creek monument signs to improve our "brand identity," and additional sidewalks in several areas of town. The Council also discussed a plan to reduce our energy consumption by 5% this year, following the recommendations of SECO, the State Energy Conservation Office.

The most important goal for our council every year is ensuring the safety of our citizens. Our Harbor Grove neighborhood does not currently have fire hydrants in the interior of the subdivision, which means in the event of a fire, extra time is required to transport water from hydrants outside the neighborhood. In our last newsletter, I mentioned that the Town of Hickory Creek and LCMUA reached an agreement to provide hydrants in the subdivision. The first phase of the project will include a loop along Harbor Lane, Hilltop Lane, and Strait Lane, and is set to begin in early October. The addition of the fire hydrants will not only provide much needed safety, but will also lower ISO ratings for the neighborhood, resulting in reduced insurance costs for our citizens.

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Road construction..... what a headache! I apologize again for the delays on Point Vista Road. Prior to construction, an Atmos gas line was marked at one depth, but when our contractors began work, they discovered the line was not as deep as indicated. The gas line is being relocated, but we have experienced longer than anticipated delays due to Atmos gas line issues in other parts of the Metroplex. A subcontractor, Pantheon, is now onsite relocating the line, and our road construction crews are ready to mobilize as soon as the relocation is complete.

Be sure to mark your calendar for Arbor Day & our annual Tree Lighting (details inside). I look forward to seeing you there!

We hope everyone is doing well and is having a great year so far. Halloween is coming, and costume parties and trick-or-treaters are coming with it. Here are some tips to consider when choosing your costumes, and to help keep you safe!

S- Swords, knives, and other costumes accessories should be short, soft and flexible.

A- Avoid trick-or-treating alone. Walk in groups or with trusted adults.

F- Fasten reflective tape to costumes and bags to help drivers see you.

E- Examine all treats for choking hazards and tampering before eating.

H- Hold a flashlight while trick-or-treating to help you see and others see you.

A- Always test makeup on small areas first.

L- Look both ways before crossing the street. Use crosswalks whenever possible.

L- Lower your risk from getting sick by not overeating candy.

O- Only walk on sidewalks and NOT on the road to prevent accidents.

W- Wear well-fitting masks, costumes, and shoes to avoid blocked vision, trips and falls.

E- Eat only factory-wrapped treats. Avoid eating homemade treats made by strangers.

E- Enter homes only if you are with a trusted adult. Only visit well lit houses.

N- Never accept rides from strangers.

LIBRARY CARDS

WATER TOWER

The new water tower for the west side of Hickory Creek is up and fully functioning. For some homes the pressure is a much needed improvement for showers, faucets, etc. If the water pressure in your home has increased and is not necessary, please contact the Lake Cities Municipal Utility Authority (LCMUA) at 940.497.2999 to have a PRV or pressure relief valve installed at no cost. Thank you to the LCMUA for their work and commitment to the citizens of Hickory Creek and the increased water pressure the tank will bring to the west side of town.

COMING SOON

We are excited to announce Hickory Creek is growing. Phase II of Shadow Creek Estates has begun and will consist of thirty-seven new homes in Hickory Creek.

There is another proposed subdivision located by Lakeview with approximately ninety new homes.

A new commercial site is also under development located at the corner of Turbeville and the I-35 Service road. A daycare will be included in the development and a couple of pad sites.

NEW & IMPROVED BUSINESSES



TREE REBATE PROGRAM

In an effort to increase your property value and improve livability in our Town, Hickory Creek is offering a tree rebate program beginning November 1, 2018 through May 1, 2019. To participate, purchase one of the qualifying trees below and you can apply for a \$25 rebate for each tree, up to three trees per property. Select a tree that is at least **five gallons in size**, costs at least **\$25**, receive a **paid invoice or receipt showing the date of purchase, supplier name, and address, the size of the tree(s), and the price of the tree (s)**. Only trees purchased between **November 1, 2018 and May 1, 2019** qualify. Residents may fill out the application online or at Town Hall for the rebate. The Town Council has appropriated a limited amount of funds for this program. Once the funds are extinguished, there will be no further rebates. Applications will be considered on a first-come, first served basis. For more information regarding the program go to our website www.hickorycreek-tx.gov. WINTERY WEATHER

Every winter, on days with freezing temperatures, multiple complaints are received about water from sprinkler systems and other sources creating icy conditions around town. The Town of Hickory Creek's Drought and Water Usage Plan states:



“A person commits an offense if he knowingly or recklessly irrigates, waters, or causes or permits the irrigation or watering of a lawn or landscape located on premises owned, leased, or managed by the person in a manner that causes....the formation of ice or any other hazardous condition.”

If you have a sprinkler system, disable the system anytime the forecast calls for freezing temperatures or install a rain/freeze sensor to prevent future problems. Also, eliminate any other ways that ice may form and create a hazard. Violations can result in the issuance of citations.

DIY: THE IMPORTANCE OF MULCH IN THE WINTER

Like presents from Santa Claus, mulch seems to be that mysterious gift of woodchips most people assume little Tree Elves leave in a nice layer around the base of some lucky trees. Not every tree, though, and certainly not in the same manner, because, let's face it, if the Tree Elves were predictable people could do it themselves!



In all seriousness, though, mulch is an important aspect to the care and maintenance of a tree – and it often gets overlooked. As a certified arborist, I get many questions about trees and tree health from friends, family, and neighbors. One question that doesn't get asked a lot, though, is about mulch.

Some neighbors mulch their trees every year. Some never do it. Some nurseries plant trees with 6-12 inches of mulch built up around the tree (entirely too much!) and others don't leave nearly enough. Fear not, though...I'll share with you a few of the main reasons and best practices for mulching so you don't have to rely on the Elves to do it for you anymore.

What is mulch? Mulch is a protective layer of inorganic or organic material spread around the base of a tree. It can take many forms and color depending on what area of the country you find yourself, but some of the more common mulches are woodchips, pine needles, leaves, or compost mixes. Although inorganic materials, like stones or pulverized rubber, can be used for mulch, most arborists prefer organic mulches for the benefits they can provide to the soil upon decomposition.

Why do we mulch? Mulching is important for many reasons, especially for newly planted trees, but the most significant reasons are listed below:

1. Mulch helps to lock in moisture and regulate temperature around the base of a tree so on a hot summer day your tree's roots don't dry out too quickly and on a cold day they are well insulated.
2. Mulch provides a protective zone spreading out from the trunk of a tree that keeps lawn care tools, like mowers and weed whackers, from damaging the trunk of the tree.
3. Mulch controls weed growth around the base of a tree that can sometimes cause competition for the growth of a tree.

Over time, organic mulches can improve the soil condition, structure, and biology around a tree.



How much and where do you put the mulch? As a general rule, mulch should be spread around the base of a tree extending out to the edge of the tree's crown (about 3 feet across) in a layer of about 2-4 inches thick. Always make sure the trunk of the tree is exposed and not covered by the mulch (about 3 inches from trunk to mulch is ideal). A mound of mulch that looks like a volcano with a tree sprouting out the top (Volcano Mulching) is NOT what you want around your tree. A good illustration of what you DO want is available at arborday.org.

When is the best time to mulch? If you are planting a new tree, make sure to water the tree slowly and then apply your mulch to help lock in the layer of moisture. After that, it's best to check your tree at least once a year to see if a new layer of mulch needs to be added. When mulch is already present, check the depth and break up any chunks that may have formed so water can still penetrate the ground through the mulch. If additional mulch is needed, add that to the top of the current mulch (ensuring the final depth is still not deeper than 2-4 inches).

There is so much more that can be shared about the benefits and how-to's of mulching but this should get you started so you don't have to wait around for the Tree Elves to do the work for you.

COMMUNITY REMINDERS



BOAT RAMP & DAY USE PASSES



Boat ramp and day use passes expire on December 31 of each year. You can purchase 2019 passes at Town Hall, online, or at the pay stations located in Arrowhead, Point Vista, and Sycamore Bend. If you purchase the pass at the park pay station you will receive a receipt that requires you to stop by Town Hall during business hours to pick up a permanent sticker. If you purchase passes online, we send the pass to you in the mail. Hickory Creek Residents receive a **FREE** day use pass but you must come by and pick it up at Town Hall. Boat ramp passes for Hickory Creek residents are \$35. Having an expired park pass can result in a citation. Please place all passes in the front windshield by the inspection sticker so they may easily be seen.

VACATION WATCH

Many of our residents will be traveling or making plans to travel in the upcoming months. To have an officer drive by and check your residence while you will be away fill out a vacation watch by going to our website at www.hickorycreek-tx.gov.



ANIMAL REGISTRATION

The Town of Hickory Creek requires all cats and dogs be registered with Animal Services annually. There is no charge to register, just bring a valid copy of their rabies vaccination certificate by town hall.

ALARM SYSTEM REGISTRATION

Hickory Creek requires that all commercial and residential alarm systems to be registered with the town every January. First time residential alarms and commercial alarm systems require a \$50 application fee. Subsequent home renewals are currently free. Failure to register an alarm system and/or multiple false alarms may result in citations and fines. Applications may be found on the Permits page of the town website or come by the Building Department at Town Hall. For more information contact 940.497.2528.



RESOLVE TO REDUCE WASTE DURING THE HOLIDAY SEASON

Since holiday celebrations and the New Year are rapidly approaching, most of us make an effort to keep a New Year's resolution or two. Whether we try to save money, lose weight, or quit certain habits, one habit worth breaking is throwing away items that can be reused or recycled.

Every year, landfills take on more and more things we no longer want or need. In fact, in 2015, Texans added about 33.5 million tons of stuff to them. That's more than six-and-a-half pounds of trash per Texan per day! If recent trends continue, that number will have increased for 2016. And at this rate, we only have enough landfill space to last another 56 years.

Here are some easy ways to reduce waste – even before the new year starts:

- Use—and reuse—gift bags, since most gift wrap is difficult to recycle.
- Serve meals on reusable plates with cloth napkins, and compost the appropriate food scraps.
- Buy only the products you need, and use up the products you buy before throwing them out. Buy products made from or packaged in recycled materials.
- Consider purchasing refurbished electronics. The average household has approximately 28 electronic devices. Old electronics can be sold or donated, or recycled.
- Rechargeable batteries are everywhere. Most can be recharged up to 1,000 times, but when they no longer hold a charge, recycle them instead of tossing them in the trash where they can pose a threat to groundwater.
- People receive more than 80 billion pieces of junk mail each year and most of it ends up in landfills. Opt out of unwanted catalogs, prescreened credit and insurance offers. And remember to recycle that junk mail you still receive. Consider reusing holiday cards in craft projects instead of tossing them in the trash.
